SIGNIFICANT ITEMS Church Council Meeting August 1, 2023

1. Paul has contacted current Council appointees, and they have all agreed to continue serving in their current positions for another term. Names will be listed in the bulletin on Sunday, with the intent of congregational approval in two weeks.

2. A cost of living increase in wages was approved for all church employees.

3. Masonry has begun work on the steps on the North side of the building. There is more damage to the structure than originally estimated. Therefore, the cost may increase, and they will also need more bricks.

4. Jeff Maust's seminary training requires a pastoral care class that requires 165 hours of church work per semester for two semesters. He can count time spent in Elders or Council meetings, preaching, teaching Sunday school, visitation, etc. John will serve as his mentor. The Council approved the plan and a stipend for his work to be included in next year's budget.

ANABAPTIST / MENONNITE / BASIC BELIEFS

The Anabaptist Movement began in 1525, 8 years after Martin Luther posted his "95 Theses" (95 Questions) on the Wittenberg Church Door in Wittenberg, Germany for all to see. This action began what we now understand as the "Protestant Reformation" - a separation from the existing Catholic Church. Martin Luther did not want to destroy the church (which for everybody in the West was the Catholic Church). He just wanted to "reform" it and get it back to its true New Testament roots. Since then, many have sought to achieve the same result.

In 1525, Conrad Grebel (a follower of Huldreich Zwingli, who himself was a colleague of John Calvin) in Switzerland felt that "reform" needed to be more than what both the Lutherans and the Calvinists had achieved. What he started became known as the "Anabaptist Movement". The name "Anabaptist" comes from the Latin which means "Ana" = again, and "baptism" = baptism. Since the followers of Grebel believed that infant baptism (which everyone experienced in the Catholic Church as well as with the Lutherans and Calvinists) was not the biblical way to baptize, their baptism after believing constituted a second baptism in the minds of the Protestants. Hence the name, "Anabaptist".

Over the years since, several Anabaptist groups have sprung up. Among the largest ones are the Mennonites in many different groups, the Brethren-related churches in several different denominations, the Amish, the Hutterite communities, and German Baptists.

While all the Mennonite Churches would be considered "conservative" relative to the rest of the Christian groups, there are divisions within the Mennonite label who see themselves as more conservative or more liberal than the others. However, seldom do these differences affect the core beliefs of the Mennonite groups. The core beliefs that all Mennonites share are the core beliefs of the Anabaptist founders nearly 500 years ago. The core beliefs of the Grebel and his followers were RADICAL at the time, and unacceptable to the Catholic Church as well as the Lutherans and the Calvinists. By 1537 when Menno Simons (who was a Catholic Priest in the Netherlands) became an Anabaptist and leader of those followers in the Netherlands, the average life span for an individual after becoming an Anabaptist leader was less than 18 months. Anabaptists were killed by the Catholics, by the Lutherans, and by the Calvinists because they were considered "heretics" and thus a grave danger to the "church".

The 5 Core Beliefs of the Anabaptists that will be covered in the next weeks are:

1) A commitment to living out your faith in your daily lives.

2) Baptism of Repentance after you believe.

3) Living a life of love and peace.

4) Separation of church and state.

5) Living as a community of believers, sharing what we have.

Few today would argue that these core beliefs are so radical that they require putting an individual to death because of them. Yet, at the time, these core beliefs were very radical . . . and very dangerous to the existing church. Probably few Christians today think of these core beliefs as all that radical and dangerous, but they do call us who claim to heirs of the Anabaptist tradition, to a life of faith that embraces everything that we do.
